### **Confirmed speakers include:**

**Marianne Comfort** represents the Sisters of Mercy on the steering committees of the US-based Catholic Climate Covenant and the Global Catholic Climate Movement. She participated in a meeting in Rome last May of Catholic organizations from around the world preparing to lift up the Pope's encyclical as soon as it was released. She's now looking forward to going to Paris in early December for the second week of the United Nations' climate talks.

**Shantha Alonoso** is the executive director of Creation Justice Ministries. Prior to joining CJM, she worked for the National Council of Churches doing young adult, anti-poverty, and eco-justice ministries, and served as vice chair of the World Student Christian Federation. Shantha is a contributing author to *For Such a Time as This: Young Adults on the Future of the Church* and editor of the anthology: *Towards a Global Christian Movement for Eco-Justice: Young Voices from North America*.

**The Rev. Michael McClain** is a National Baptist Convention, USA minister, and the southeastern field director of the African American Climate Initiative with the National Council of Churches.
